Hasidic Group Wins uit on Rabbi's Books

A Federal appeals court has ruled in or of a Brooklyn-based Hasidic vish group in a bitter two-year rt battle over ownership of its forrabbi's huge collection of books.

The United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit in Manhattan affirmed Tuesday a ruling by a lower court that the library was not part of the estate of the rabbi, Joseph Isaac Schneersohn, and rejected claims of ownership by his grandson.

Rabbi Schneersohn, the spiritual leader of the Brooklyn-based Lubavitcher Hasidic movement, Agudas Chasidei Chabad, died in 1950 without leaving a will.

In a unanimous ruling on the lawsuit, the three-judge appeals panel found that during his lifetime Rabbi . that indicated Schneersohn wanted to leave the books to the Hasidic group rather than his family.

The grandson, Barry Gourary, said he could not comment on whether he would appeal until he saw the opinion.

At issue in the lawsuit that began in August 1985 was the ownership of a valuable library consisting of 40,000 to 50,000 religious and secular books as well as sacred manuscripts by the group's rabbis, some of which dated to the 18th century. - (AP)

A Colon Problem For Gov. O'Neill

HARTFORD Doctors treating William Gov. O'Neill said yesterday that they had diagnosed diverticulitis, an inflammation and infection of small pockets of the colon, as the probable cause of the high fever that hospitalized him on Sunday.

A statement from St. Francis Hospital and Medical Center also said tests had found two colon polyps, or small growths, that the doctors said appeared to be benign.

The statement said no surgery was anticipated and that diverticulitis could be treated by dietary restrictions, intravenous fluids and antibiotics. The polyps are to be be removed later with an outpatient colonoscopy procedure, the hospital said.

Mr. O'Neill, who is 57 years old, is expected to remain in the hospital through the beginning of next week, the statement said. He was described as being in good spirits

U.S. Jury Indicts Man In Youth-Sex Case

BROOKLYN A bus company manager was indicted yesterday on Federal charges of unlawfully transporting two young girls to New Jersey to engage in prostitution, the authorities said.

The defendant, Victor Einhorn, 36 years old, was arrested last July 7 at a motel in Fort Lee, N.J., and charged with sexual assault and aggravated sexual assault. He was released on \$75,000 bail.

The Federal indictment charges that Mr. Einhorn took the girls, 12 and 13 years old, from Brooklyn to a New Jersey motel six times between May and July. An assistant Bergen County prosecutor, Fred Schwanwee, said Mr. Einhorn gave the girls \$20 to \$30 several times.

Mr. Einhorn, of Monsey, N.Y., and Brooklyn, manages the Private Trails Bus Company of Brooklyn, the

authorities said.

He is charged with 12 counts of unlawfully transporting minors for the purpose of engaging in prostitution and other unlawful sexual activity. If convicted on all counts, he would face a maximum of 120 years in jail and a \$3 million fine. He is to be arraigned today in Brooklyn.
